
- The report will be completed by March 31st for distribution.

- The results of the most recent review by the Secretary (triennial or follow-up monitoring review)
- The percentage of enrolled children that received health insurance
- Information about parent involvement activities
- Head Start's efforts to prepare children for kindergarten (school readiness data)
- Any other information required by the Secretary










Children Enrolled Based on Selection Criteria:










Child Body Mass Index- Number of Children



Number of Children on Individual Education Plan (IEP): 6 (7%)







Social and Emotional Development

Goal: Shows Awareness, Self Regulates and Manages feelings, emotions and behaviors of self.

As Demonstrated By: The ability to calm with support, find other solutions and talk about feelings.

Goal: Child will be able to recognize emotions and feelings of others and form positive relationships through conflict resolution.

As Demonstrated By: Showing concern for others and recognizing ways to "be a friend".

Language and Literacy

Goal: Child will use language to communicate and express self and interact with others while gaining knowledge.

As Demonstrated By: Asking questions for answers and being understood by adults and Peers.

Goal: Child will have and understanding and appreciation for books and written Materials.

As Demonstrated By: Showing an interest in books as well as respecting and using properly.

Goal: Child will be able to recognize, identify, alliterate and write letters of the alphabet.

As Demonstrated By: Sing the ABCs, understand alliteration and write their name along with other letters of the alphabet.

Cognition

Goal: Child will have a desire to explore, investigate and learn from their environment to gain understanding.

As Demonstrated By: Participating actively in experiments and investigations.

Goal: Child will use knowledge and memory from exploration to think up and develop problem-solving strategies.

As Demonstrated By: Coming up with multiple solutions.

Goal: Child will recognize numbers, quantities, patterns, shapes and simple measurements.

As Demonstrated By: Counting, counting objects, making patterns, recognizing shapes and writing numbers.

Perceptual, Motor, and Physical Development

Goal: Child will be able to use and control large muscles.

As Demonstrated By: Running, kicking a ball, riding a bike and using a balance beam.

Goal: Child will be able to manipulate small objects and correctly use writing tools.

As Demonstrated By: Using beads and writing name.

Approaches to Learning

Goal: Child will be able to maintain attention and focus for a reasonable amount of time.

As Demonstrated By: Participating in circle time and other scheduled tasks.

Goal: Child will take initiative, show interest and be persistent in learning.

As Demonstrated By: Follow through on completing tasks or being able return the same task.

Goal: Child will use creativity and imagination in the learning process.

As Demonstrated By: Participating in dramatic play, role play music and dance.

Goal: Child will be able to control impulses and follow rules.

As Demonstrated By: Participating in rule making and enforcing.

Culture

Goal: Children will have an understanding of Ojibwe Culture.

As Demonstrated By: Children will participate in "Mini Pow Wows", and other activities that arise through volunteer community members and opportunity. Children will be able to talk about their experiences and knowledge of Ojibwe Culture. Every day one circle time will be designated to teaching the Language and reading books. Children will also have the opportunity to do arts and crafts related to Ojibwe Culture.





Recent Audit Findings: The most recent Audit report noted that there were no non-compliance items.






Ethnicity of children served:




Children Enrolled Based on Selection Criteria:








